Magnifico—the master, evil, looks down on everyone, physicality like an eagle.

Zanni: the servant, peasant, curious, enthusiastic, physicality like a pigeon.

Pantalone: old master, miserly, mean, friends with the Doctor.

The Doctor: man of learning, leads with his stomach, knows everything but understands nothing.

Arlecchino (the Harlequin): servant, has no logic, happy go lucky, cheeky, always hunger.

Columbina: servant, cunning and playful, intelligent.
Brighella: servant, cunning

#### **HISTORY**

- Started in Venice in 1600s.
- First time woman were seen on stage.
- Characters represented the different types of people in society from kings to servants.
- It was street performance.
- Troupes travelled around Europe performing.
- Scenes were improvised around planned entrances and exits.
  - No scene were more than 3 mintues long.
  - The relationship between performers and audience was key.

## **KEY WORDS & TERMS**

Lazzi: comic business that interrupts the scene.

Gromalot: babble speak. It sounds like language but is made up.

Stock Character: characters that is easily recognisable to the audience because of their reoccurring appearance.

Improvisation: performing without rehearsing, making it up on the spot.

Slapstick: a form of comedy that is based on deliberately clumsy actions and embarrassing events.

The Fourth Wall: an imagined wall separating actors from the audience. While the audience can see through this "wall", the convention assumes, the actors act as if they cannot.

<u>Clocking the Audience</u> when a performer acknowledges the audience, breaking the fourth wall. Often used to create comedy.
