The aim of the Government's new Pupil Premium is to raise achievement among disadvantaged children

10. LEC: Learning Enhancement Centre

The LEC provides additional provision within the schools pastoral and curriculum support systems e.g. by reducing exclusions,, providing effective support for vulnerable students, targeted provision for pupils with social, emotional, behavioural and or attendance problems, and provides part time flexible provision for students with particular difficulties in certain lessons.

11. Pastoral Coordinators: (Mentoring)

The main focus for the work of the PC is to:

- increase levels of attendance and punctuality
- raise attainment and potential
- reduce exclusions identify and support vulnerable students (time management, revision techniques, organisation etc)

Peripatetic teachers teach students to play a musical instrument with tuition of half an hour a session.

Academic Year 2012-13

Students entitled to pupil premium make up approximately 5% of the student population. For the academic year 2012/13 the school received additional funding for students totalling £52,800.
