How can you revise for this subject?

- 1. Make sure you understand the set up of the exam and how you are assessed
- 2. Use your glossary to make sure you understand which key terms relate to each musical element for example: homophonic, polyphonic & monophonic are all types of musical texture
- 3. Use your knowledge organisers and memorise the key facts about each set work: Tempo, time signature, tonality & any modulations, the instruments that feature in the piece to name a few
- 4. Practice! Complete all essay questions and listening homework to allow us to give you extra feedback
- 5. Read example essays
- 6. **Regularly** listen to the anthology tracks, and listen to a wide selection of music from the same time period or by the same composer
- 7. Work through your revision guide and workbook
